Gas Leak Safety: Recognize, Respond and React

1. Recognize Gas Leak Warning Signs

A gas leak may be recognized by smell, sight or sound.



Smell – Natural gas is colorless and odorless. A distinctive, sulfur-like odor is added to natural gas to help with leak detection. But not all gas is odorized, so do not rely on your nose alone to detect a leak.



Sight – Outdoors you may see continual bubbling in water, or dirt spraying or blowing into the air. Or you may see plants or grass dead or dying for no apparent reason in an otherwise moist area.



Sound – You may hear an unusual noise like hissing, roaring or whistling sound coming from the ground or from gas equipment.



Gas leaks can penetrate the soil beneath plant life, killing them at the root and leaving a visible warning sign.

2. Respond Immediately if You Suspect a Leak

If you suspect a gas leak, assume there's a danger.

- ◆ Warn others and leave the area quickly.
- ◆ If you smell something, say something.
- ◆ Do NOT use the telephone or any electrical appliances including light switches, garage door openers, doorbells, radios, TVs or cell phones.



Natural gas requires air and an ignition source in order to burn. An electric arc from a light switch can ignite the gas.

3. React by Reporting the Leak to Emergency Officials

Do NOT assume someone else will report the leak.

- ◆ From a safe location, dial **911** or call National Grid's gas emergency number at **1-718-643-4050**. Provide the exact location, including cross streets, and let us know if sewer construction or digging activities are going on in the area.
- ◆ Do NOT go back inside your home or building until National Grid personnel say it is safe to return.



Once evacuated and in a safe location, call to report suspected gas leaks or possible pipeline damage—no damage is too small to report.

Smell gas. Act fast.

What's in a name? Do you know the difference in the meaning of these parking signs?

	NO STOPPING	NO STANDING	NO PARKING
Can I stop to drop off or pick up passengers?	No	Yes	Yes
Can I stop to load or unload a package, or merchandise at curbside?	No	No	Yes
Is waiting allowed?	No	No	No

All of NYC was designated a Tow Away Zone under the State's Vehicle & Traffic law in 1959. This means that any vehicle parked or operated illegally, or with missing or expired registration or inspection stickers may be towed.

On **MAJOR LEGAL HOLIDAYS**, stopping, standing and parking are permitted **except** in areas where stopping, standing and parking rules are in effect seven days a week (for example, "No Standing Anytime"). Accordingly, parking meters will not be in effect on major legal holidays.

Double-parking of passenger vehicles is illegal at all times, including street cleaning days, regardless of location, purpose or duration.

It is illegal to park within 15 feet of either side of a fire hydrant. Painted curbs at hydrant locations **DO NOT** indicate where you can park.

An occupied, illegally parked vehicle causes the same safety hazard and congestion as an unoccupied vehicle. Be responsible and park legally.
